Launch Pad

Launch Pad is a fast paced, engaging enterprise challenge which provides an introduction to employability skills.

Students work alongside inspiring Business Volunteers who support students to discover more about themselves and develop key skills which are valued in the workplace.

Through a series of hands on, fun activities students work in teams on the early stages of launching a fledgling business, balancing a budget as well as creating a brand identity and marketing strategy.

Students learn about their personal strengths and preferences and what this means for both working in a team and for their own development. Through the day students will learn the importance of teamwork and learn more about different roles that contribute to running a business.
